Covenant Service

Due to the snow on Sunday 5th January the Covenant Service was postponed until the 2nd February to enable people to come to this important annual service, hopefully unhampered by the weather. I encourage you to join us.

Here is some information about the service

Jeremiah 31:33

³³ "But this is the new covenant I will make with the people of Israel after those days," says the Lord. "I will put my instructions deep within them, and I will write them on their hearts. I will be their God, and they will be my people.

Origins and purpose of the Covenant Service

Since 1755 Methodist have gathered each year to recognise and renew the covenant relationship they have with God, both as individuals and as a gathered community of believers.

The service celebrates God's gracious offer to be our God, and we God's people. The offer is of a loving relationship, freely and graciously made possible through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

The Covenant is the means of grace by which we accept this offer, committing ourselves anew and rededicating ourselves to an ongoing relationship with God. It is not to be entered into lightly as in the Covenant we make challenging promises, to accept God's commitment to us by committing ourselves to God in return.

Such a commitment challenges us to accept that we are accepted by a loving, generous God. In accepting God's Covenant gift, we offer to live our lives in relationship with God. We do this, not in our own strength, but in the power of the Holy Spirit which encourages and enables us to live out our side of the relationship as God's ways are written on our hearts.

All are welcome

All are welcome to share in a Covenant Service, whether you are sharing in a Covenant Service for the first time, have done it annually for many years, or simply want to watch what others do without taking part yourself.

The service is a gift not a demand! And God will give you the grace to do it all. You are not alone!



The Covenant Service and beyond



While we no longer have a series of meetings to explore the Covenant, or a day's retreat before the service, I encourage you to read and pray about the Covenant prayer and think about what God is calling you to in 2025. The service is always the main service of the day and includes the sacrament of the Lord's Supper, reminding us of the gift of life and relationship we receive through God's grace.

A grace and love that constantly prompts and seeks to transform us, as we continually seek and pray to grow in holiness and love. After the service, we are encouraged, therefore, to continue to work out the implications for our lives of the fact our relationship with God has been renewed in and through Christ.

Recipe Corner

In each issue we will feature a classic recipe from individual members of the church family plus our amazing Lunch Club chefs! This time we are featuring a classic cut and come again fruit loaf that is ideal buttered with a hot cuppa.

BRAN FRUIT LOAF

Ingredients:

4oz/100g 'All Bran' type cereal

5oz/150g Caster Sugar 10oz/275g Mixed dried fruit

1/2pint/300ml Milk

4oz/100g Self Raising Flour

Method:

- Preheat your oven to 180 degrees Centigrade/350 degrees Fahrenheit/Gas mark 4
- 2. Put 'All Bran', sugar and dried fruit into a bowl and mix well together.
- 3. Stir in the milk and leave to stand for 30 minutes.
- 4. Sieve in the flour, mixing well.
- 5. Pour mixture into a well-greased 2lb/900g loaf tin.
- 6. Bake for about one hour.
- 7. Turn out immediately to cool.
- 8. Slice and butter.
- 9. Enjoy!

Junior Mission for All



Sunday Club has been learning about the history and the work of JMA. Some of our Club also have a collection box ready to relieve you of your loose change on the 1st Sunday of the month so be prepared! JMA dates back to 1812 when Joseph Blake was inspired by a sermon about missionary work. He began to encourage the children in his

Sunday School class to bring a half penny every week to contribute to mission work. Other Sunday Schools copied the idea and in 1815 the Junior Missionary Society was established at City Road, London. JMA became an integral part of the Methodist Church in 1841 and by 1932 the Methodist Uniting Conference was encouraging every Circuit and if possible, every local church to have their own JMA. Knitting Needs!

A note from Elizabeth

I have been knitting 'squares' to sew together to create varying size rugs for many years. Some have been shipped to the Ukraine, smaller ones to Leeds hospitals and others to refugee camps. These all take wool! I would be very pleased to receive any DOUBLE KNITTING yarn you have spare. I try to use only what I am given (recycling) but recently have had to purchase some as I have virtually 'run out'. If you do have any spare of any size balls DOUBLE KNITTING please leave in the church vestibule FAO Elizabeth Wearing. Thank you for your help.



Other knitting projects

Violet and Nicola combine forces to create knitted bears that have new homes with the babies admitted to special care baby units in Leeds. At the end of the babies' treatment the bears go home with their new owners. There is a constant need for new bears and they are knit using a simple garter stitch pattern. Do speak to Nicola and Violet if you would like to help.



Charity crème egg chicks for JMA

A few of us have been knitting chicks for charity projects over the years. This year we would like to knit and sell our crème egg chicks in aid of JMA. There are 4 ways you can help: knitting to a simple pattern, buying double knitting wool in shades of yellow for our knitters, buying a box of crème eggs to stuff the knitted chicks with or pledging to buy crème egg chicks for your friends and family. Please speak to Nicola initially. If you would like to start knitting the pattern is below. Thank you!

Simple Easter Chick

Please use YELLOW double knitting wool and size 4mm needles (old size no. 8), 3.25mm or 3.5mm also ok. GARTER STITCH THROUGHOUT

Cast on 24 stitches

Knit 6 rows

Increase 1 stitch at each end of the next 7 rows (38 stitches)

Knit 1 row

Cast off 11 stitches at the beginning of the next two rows (16 stitches)

Knit 10 rows

Knit 2 tog 8 times (8 stitches)

Knit 2 tog 4 times (4 stitches)

Knit 2 tog twice (2 stitches

Fasten off remaining 2 stitches leaving a 12 inch length of wool which is sufficient for the chicks to be sewn up.

To Finish

Fold in half to create the chick shape and sew from head to bottom edge leaving an opening big enough to take a crème egg without it falling out!

Use black wool to sew two eyes and a diamond shaped piece of felt for the beak. Nicola is happy to sew up for



you and add the finishing touches.
