## From our Minister

Dear Friends,

Recently, I went to the ballet for the first time, Tschaikovsky's *The Nutcracker*, accompanied by a live orchestra. Although the music and dancing were excellent, in the interval I did an internet search to find out what the plot was, as I wasn't quite sure what was going on. Online reviews of the ballet company suggested that while they were technically excellent, they lacked a little in the story telling. Perhaps that was why I couldn't work out what was going on.

On further reflection, I wondered whether my lack of understanding might be because ballet tells the story only through music and dance. As someone with limited musicality and even more limited ballet experience, this is a language that I am not familiar with. Having read the plot, I was in a slightly better place to appreciate the story in the second half. Although I struggled to grasp the nuances of a story told in this way, I still enjoyed the experience, recognising the skill and dedication of dancers and musicians, the creativeness and technical ability of the costume designers, and the genius of Tchaikovsky's music. I left the theatre, thoroughly uplifted and entertained, resolving to go to another ballet, but perhaps after doing my homework first.

My only experience of ballet before this, other than watching classes when our daughters were very young, was watching the DVD of Barbie in the Nutcracker some 20 years ago. Experience that hadn't prepared me for the reality of seeing a ballet in the flesh, the skill of dancers and musicians as well as with the reality, that ballet shoes squeak on stage, like plimsols on a sports hall floor, and there are loud thuds when dancers land after performing their leaps.

So, what is my point?

It occurred to me, that just as I had little or no experience of ballet, many of our friends, neighbours, families and those in our local community have little experience or understanding of God, Church or faith. What we believe and why, is alien to them. In the same way that I struggled at the ballet, they struggle to understand the nuances, significance and message of hope we are trying to share.

Advent and Christmas is a time when this gap between the gospel of hope, personified in the birth of Jesus, and people's current experience is at its narrowest. It is a time when people go to school nativities, hear carols sung in streets and shopping centres and perhaps think about going to a carol service in a local church. Our Advent theme this year is **Gifted** a message of hope and good news for a dark and weary world. A reminder that, in the words of the John Lewis Christmas advert, "if you can't find the words, find the gift." Jesus is the ultimate gift, a gift of love from God to all humanity at Christmas, and we are also gifts to each other, to our families,



our friends and our communities. Each one of us special, important and loved by God.

Reflecting on my experience at the ballet, I wonder if this Advent and Christmas, we need to think again about how we share this message of HOPE for the world, sharing it so it can be understood, so people know that they are special, important and loved. I believe this is best done by living and breathing this message of hope and love. By treating everyone we meet as if we are meeting Jesus in them, because it is our behaviour folk see first – how we act, how we respond to others, our graciousness or sadly, lack thereof.

So this advent, as we prepare to welcome once again, the with-us-God, love incarnate, let us be a people of hope, of love, of acceptance and of welcome to all.

### Rediscovering curiosity at the heart of faith

"Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path."

Psalms 119 v105

Do you welcome the opportunity to learn more about the Christian faith, to explore stories from the Bible or the experiences of other people and reflect on what they might teach us?

Where do you practice curiosity in your day to day life? Maybe in what you read or watch or spend your time on? Do you seek out the stories of others from different backgrounds and experiences to enrich your understanding? Do you notice things when you are out and about?

What might God be encouraging you to be more curious about?

### Rediscovering justice at the heart of life

"What does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?"

Do you like to get stuck in to making a difference in your community? Do you long to see justice on issues of poverty, or climate change, or discrimination? # Recipe Corner

In each issue we will feature a classic recipe from individual members of the church family plus our amazing Lunch Club chefs! This time Jean Beckingham shares the secret of her famous Muesli Bars!

## Muesli Bars

### Ingredients

- 150g plain cooking chocolate
- 3 tablespoons golden syrup
- 25g butter
- 225g Swiss style muesli cereal
- 150g milk cooking chocolate



### Method

- Melt the plain chocolate with the golden syrup and butter.
- Stir in the cereal and mix thoroughly.
- Press into a shallow 19cm square tin.
- Melt the milk chocolate and spread over the cereal mixture.
- Chill until set, marking out into “bars” of the desired size, part way through this process.
- Enjoy!

NB: Caution re- portion sizes- these are yummy but very rich 😊

Ingredient amounts can be easily adapted for a smaller tin.

## St. Michael's Hospice



Woodlands Church Family have been supporting the Hospice since it opened in 1989 with five inpatient beds in the Convent of Society of the Holy Child Jesus on Oatlands Drive. In 1992 an appeal was launched to raise £1.4 million to buy Crimple House, in 1994 the target was achieved, and a 10-bed inpatient unit was opened. Our support started 25 years ago by collecting Pennies in Smartie tubes, we now collect 1p, 5p, 20p and £1 coins in *Steradent* tubes a sign of just how long we have continued to support them. At present all Hospices are suffering a lack of funds the Government only supplies 25% of the money required to run the Hospice the rest of the money has to be raised by fundraising and donations. So please can I encourage you to pick up a tube from the Vestibule or talk to me or Elizabeth Wearing? Elizabeth will be taking over the collection of the tubes and paying the money into the Hospice from 1 January 2026.

# Harrogate & District Foodbank

A big thank you to those who take the time to bring some groceries along to church each month to put in the baskets for the Foodbank. All the donations however big or small are very much appreciated. Read on for an update from one of the Foodbank Trustees:

Last year the Foodbank fed 4,059 people which breaks down into 2,750 adults and 1,309 children. A new Foodbank location also opened at Jennyfields.

Woodlands Methodist Church and friends donated 525 kg of food, that is over half a tonne! This is a fantastic amount especially as many people are struggling with the current cost-of-living crisis. The amount donated in 2024 was similar to that of 2023. Your donations really make a huge difference in the fight against food poverty locally.

Many hours of work have gone into creating these pieces so a huge shout out to Violet, Sheila, Pam, Helen and Nicola plus our distant member Susan from Bishop Auckland who has generated a few hundred of the poppies! The next project is creating felt angel decorations to give away at the Christmas services. New members always welcome, we meet on alternate Thursday mornings in term time from 10am to 11.30am with coffee provided. Speak to Nicola for the next set of dates.





# Circuit Update

Many of you will be aware of the Circuit Regrouping Exercise that is currently being undertaken. The following information was shared with the Woodlands congregation in August following the meeting between Rev Ben Clowes, Circuit Superintendent and the Woodlands steward team with Ian in attendance as Chaplain.

With Lesley Taylor sitting down (retiring) next September the Circuit has a responsibility to ensure that all churches have a named Minister. This will require some restructuring of the churches / circuit to reduce the weight of governance and reflect the reduction in Presbyters from four to three. This reduction means that doing nothing is not an option.

## First Steps

As part of this activity, Ben Clowes and a Circuit Steward visited **all 13 chapels** over the summer to talk to the steward / leadership teams (for a maximum of one hour) and gather information about what they are doing now, what they may do in the future and whether there are any existing links between the circuit churches. Part of the pre-work for each church was to reflect on current and future activities within the Three Mission Policy Priorities - worship, **mission** and **discipleship** - approved by the Circuit Meeting in September 2022.



Woodlands' Stewards and Ian met with Rev Ben Clowes on Tuesday 12<sup>th</sup> August. Ben made it clear that nothing has been decided, and this meeting was to listen to the churches. The meeting covered:

- Where Woodlands is against the Mission Policies
- Current links with other circuit churches or ecumenically + potential future synergies



- Potential options for the future organisation of the circuit. Ben reminded us that all options, other than not changing anything, are on the table.

### ***Next Steps / Future***

- Stewards to share informally with Church Members the discussions ***(A more detailed document is available, please ask for a copy)***
- Circuit Leadership Team to consolidate outcomes from these meetings and prepare proposals for the re-grouping of the Circuit.
- 15th November 2025: Circuit Away Day to present options for the Circuit to reps from all the chapels. Caroline, Mark, David Munroe and Sylvia attended from Woodlands.
- March 2026: Circuit Meeting coming to a decision.
- Spring / Summer 2026: Implement the new structure

- Starbeck/Scotton/Park Grove/Gracious Street/Kirk Hammerton/Kearby

## Focus on Prayer & Fellowship

There are two prayer trees at Woodlands, one in the middle hall and one in the prayer corner. Both are supplied with a basket of cardboard leaves to write on and a ribbon to hang on the tree. Please make use of them for personal prayers, prayers for the world, prayers for the community. etc. There are a lot of stories in the daily news on tv and radio that need prayer.

Sign up to the daily prayer online from the Methodist Church which also appears on their Facebook page and ours.

The Methodist Prayer handbook is published each September with a wealth of ready made prayers and prayer pointers for the Methodist Church worldwide. Each page focusses on an area of the world as well as a district in the UK. Photos are also included; it could be the Darlington circuit on a pilgrimage or a street market in Guyana.

Various Christian organisations have their own prayer diaries you can subscribe to. Examples include Mission Aviation Fellowship, Bible Society, Operation Mobilisation, Leprosy Mission, Christians Against Poverty and Scripture Union. Check out the prayer resources of the organisation you support.

We have learnt recently about the importance of the Methodist Church's original class system, similar to today's Pastoral visitors each with their dedicated list of church family to pray for, visit and support. Our valued team of Pastoral Visitors under the direction of Sylvia Fox were rededicated recently. They are committed to looking after YOU.

Two house groups operate out of Woodlands, the weekly Thursday morning group and the monthly Women of Woodlands (WoW) group that meets on a Monday evening. These are supported by 'pop up' seasonal groups for Lent and Christmas. These groups offer an informal environment to share and grow, you don't need Bible knowledge either as we all learn together through conversation and following a set study that has something for everyone.

Don't forget the valuable fellowship over a mug of coffee after service on Sundays and look out for our new coffee mornings in the Spring!



## Chapel Focus: Kirk Hammerton



There has been a Methodist chapel in the Kirk Hammerton since at least 1812 and the present one has been here since 1899. We thank the members from Tockwith who take an active part in chapel activities, without whom our continuation would be in doubt. For many years now we have worked with the Anglican congregation to show a joint presence in village life and provide a varied form of worship. We are continually reviewing this relationship to ensure that we use our resources to the best advantage. In recent times the Chapel has been used for a variety of village meetings etc. Members are pleased for it to be used in this way. Services are held at 10:30am on Sundays, alternating with the Anglican church every fourth Sunday.
